Hello Coleen,

It was nice talking with you. Thanks for reaching out.

Attached is the fact sheet and flyer I mentioned. I also included a statement at the bottom of this email for your use. One note on the fact sheet – I talked with the Denver Rescue Mission this morning and they have seen an uptick in people accessing the shelter recently, so that number should be adjusted to reflect the downtown and Peoria shelters are operating at about 90% capacity.

Over the weekend and this morning, the flyers were distributed in the area. Today, between 8:30 and 9 a.m., crews with Denver Public Works put into place approximately 30 street signs advising of the encumbrance ordinance and potential for enforcement. We don't have a firm timeframe on when we might take action on violations. The city must provide at least 24-hour notice, which happened today with the posting of the signs, but no decision has been made on what, when, where, etc.

This is all in relation to the city's encumbrance ordinance, so I want to note that the city is not clearing people from the sidewalks. What we are attempting to do is a cleanup of an area that has increasingly become a concern from both a public safety and public health standpoint. People will be asked to remove their items from the sidewalk. If they do not, then the city may choose to clear the sidewalks of said items. If that happens, then any personal belongings will be taken to a warehouse location at 1221 Glenarm. The city has worked for six months to try and remedy this situation at Park and Lawrence without taking this step. It was not a decision made lightly, but it is one supported by several of our nonprofit partners, the neighborhood and area businesses.

Here is a Statement you may use and attribute to me as a city spokesperson:

"Since last September, various city agencies have been working closely with homeless outreach workers and providers to connect people living on the streets in the Ballpark Neighborhood with shelter, housing and other support services like food and medical benefits. We have also increased efforts to keep the neighborhood free of trash, debris and waste. Together, through this intensive and focused effort, we have helped hundreds of people and supported the community. However, the health, safety and welfare of those who continue to live outside on the streets and sidewalks is nearing a crisis. This unsafe, unhealthy, unsanitary and inhumane situation must be addressed. The City will be increasing our efforts to connect people with services and in order to avoid a looming public health and safety emergency, starting this

month, we will be strictly enforcing various city codes. I want to stress that we will be taking great care to protect the personal belongings of people living on the streets as we intensify efforts to keep the neighborhood clean, safe and sanitary."

As we discussed, the annual point in time count includes people in shelters, in transitional supportive housing, in safe haven or on the streets. From page 33 of the report on Denver County, there were 3,737 homeless individuals identified on January 26, 2015. Of them, 45% were in transitional housing; 37% were in a shelter; 2% were in a safe haven; and 16% were on the street (approx. 597). In the event the city's shelters did reach capacity, we do have a shelter plan that we would put into action to ensure that we shelter everyone willing.

We are working on a number of housing and other initiatives within the homelessness continuum. At least 250 people who are chronically homeless will be housed through projects funded by the city's social impact bonds; we're creating a new Solutions Center for people experiencing a behavioral or mental health crisis, including the homeless; will be training people throughout the city on mental health first aid – this is designed to help people identify a mental health issue when it is occurring; we are creating a pilot day jobs program for the homeless to provide paid day work opportunities at city agencies; and other housing, health and jobs initiatives for those who find themselves without a home in our city.

Attached is a fact sheet for your use. I just talked with the Denver Rescue Mission this morning and do want to update that number on the sheet. They saw a slight increase in shelter usage recently, so they are reporting that they are currently operating at about 90 percent capacity between the downtown and Peoria locations. That said, it is worth noting that the city has an overflow shelter plan in place that would allow us to utilize other sites if the need outpaced current sites.

One stat worth mentioning is the point in time count. The total counted in the annual survey has been thrown out as if it is a count of people "on the streets" and that is incorrect. The annual point in time count also considers people that are in shelters and in transitional supportive housing. From page 33 of the report on Denver County, there were 3,737 homeless individuals identified on January 26, 2015. Of them, 45% were in transitional housing; 37% were in a shelter; 2% were in a safe haven; and 16% were on the street (approx. 597).

I also want to note that the city is able to provide short-term care for pets if that is needed to minimize the barrier of someone seeking shelter — especially in cold weather. We are working as hard and thoughtfully as possible to break down these types of barriers for folks so that we can get them into the shelters — or into supportive housing, for that matter.

I know there are some who wish to make this into a criminalization or enforcement action. It is not. We just need to clean up the site for the sake of everyone – including those who are encamped. It is just not sanitary or safe. However, the voice of the community should also not be lost in this conversation. We've worked for six months to try and remedy this situation without having to take this step. It was not a decision made lightly, but it is one supported by several of our nonprofit partners, the neighborhood and area businesses.

Finally, needless to say, we are working on housing and a number of pieces to this entire homelessness continuum. We will house at least 250 chronically homeless through projects funded by social impact bonds; we're creating a new Solutions Center for people experiencing a behavioral or mental health crisis, including the homeless; will be training people throughout the city on mental health first aid; are creating a pilot day jobs program for the homeless; etc. Would love to talk about any and all of these at any point and, frankly, could only dream of getting coverage on any of those items like we are on cleaning the sidewalks.

Sorry to get on a bit of a tangent! I hope this information is helpful. Feel free to email again if you need/want more.

Denver, CO -- Denver City Officials announced that starting Tuesday March 8th, 2016 they will be seizing all people's belongings and kicking everyone "away" who stays outside in the areas around Samaritan house (Park Ave/Lawrence/Broadway/and surrounding blocks). Currently at least 75 people live outside in this area every night and many hundred more stay in this area during the day. People who have made the best home they can out of tarps and sleeping bags, and if they are lucky, tents, will be forced to leave and/or have this

survival gear taken to a far off location with some vague promise of retrieving it from the police -- if they can jump through all the hoops. Even if this survival gear, IDs, and valuable belongings are retrieved, the city says they cannot return to this area to sleep with any cover.

Houseless people through no fault of their own living in public space, have no choice for survival to use tarps, sleeping bags, tents, anything for shelter that currently violates the urban camping ban. The meager belongings that folks use for survival will be confiscated leaving them with nothing to use for their daily needs. This is a violation of their human rights. We are demanding that our Mayor Michael Hancock put an immediate stop to this sweep.

City Officials say, "no shelter has turned away any homeless person wanting to enter" and that there is room for all those currently staying outside to stay in the shelter. This is simply not true. If you look at numbers it breaks down like this: The City lists just under 1,500 emergency shelter beds and mats. The 2015 Point In Time Count, known to be an undercount, counted 3,456 people experiencing homelessness in Denver city proper on one night. If you do the math that is 9 people for every 4 shelter beds. Bottom line - if every homeless person sleeping on the streets of Denver tried to stay in the shelters tonight there would not be room.

Furthermore, even if there were enough shelter beds and mats for all those without homes in Denver that does not address the need. People need home, dignity, community, protection from the elements, etc... and for many shelters are not a place where these needs can be met. There are countless reasons why a great many people will not or cannot live in shelters including: couples not wanting to be separated from their partners; having a pet; working hours that do not correspond with shelter hours; mental health; health and safety issues in shelters; having a need for autonomy/humanity/independence. Many people stay in this area together for safety because it is safer to stay together with others than to be off alone in a hidden corner. If the indoor option we are talking about is shelters, the City's statement that, "The safest, most sanitary and dignified place for people experiencing homelessness is indoors" is simply not true. For many many people it is safer and more dignified to stay outdoors with a tarp and blanket. We must respect people's right to live where they need to best survive through homelessness.

So we ask "move along to where...?"

This threat of big sweeps starting Tuesday comes after regular sweeps, including destruction of property, over the past many months. One of the most serious sweeps happened on December 15th, 2015 when <u>roughly 100 people were kicked out</u>, belongings thrown straight in the trash, and told if they returned they would be arrested. Many folk did leave the area to other more hidden outdoor spots, but many came back and set back up in the same general area.

According to Denver city officials there is a shortage of 40,000 affordable housing units in Denver. Spark Policy Institute reports that "A household must earn an hourly wage of \$17.61 to make the Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Colorado affordable." And further "There is not a single county in Colorado where the Fair Market Rent for a studio, one-bedroom or two-bedroom unit would be considered affordable for a minimum wage worker." Bottom line - people cannot afford homes even when working a full time job.

In the midst of Denver's greatest housing crisis in years we cannot allow our city leaders to kick people around, take their belongings, and force people to move along out of sight out of mind. We demand that Mayor Michael Hancock put an immediate stop to the sweeps.

Downtown Denver Homeless Outreach

- The City works with shelters to ensure those who are homeless can find a safe place to stay, and we are projected to spend \$47 million this year on dozens of direct and indirect costs related to homelessness.
- To date, no shelter has turned away any homeless person wanting to enter. Shelters are providing beds and
 mats to as many as 1,500 people per night, with Denver Rescue Mission's downtown shelter and overflow
 facility in Northeast Denver still operating at 79 percent of capacity.
- Unfortunately, a number of homeless individuals continue to camp outside the Samaritan House and Denver Rescue Mission shelters. The majority of those individuals refuse services, including shelters.
- Since September, employees from multiple city agencies have connected more than 650 people outside and
 inside these shelters with medical, food, bus passes, housing, mental health and other services.
- Even with this increased outreach and the opening of the Lawrence Street Community Center, which is serving
 about 900 people per day, this unsafe, unhealthy, unsanitary and inhumane situation continues. People are
 still sleeping outside, even in the cold, and items continue to pile up on sidewalks.
- The Department of Public Works has been on site three days a week to remove the considerable trash
 accumulating in the area and to power-wash sidewalks (when weather appropriate). In January, PW increased
 trash removal and sidewalk cleaning to five days a week.
- Beginning this month, the city will take the following actions to protect people, maintain public health, and respond to mounting concerns from nearby residents and businesses:
 - Post information Public Works will post information around the area advising that public spaces must remain free of obstruction. The same information will be distributed to people encamped on the public right of way. People will be strongly encouraged to seek shelter and services and <u>not</u> leave items behind.
 - Continue to connect people to services Outreach teams will continue to connect individuals with services. Those who continue to violate city codes will receive a verbal warning. Subsequent encounters with the same individuals who remain in violation of city codes will result in progressive punishment.
 - Enact temporary storage for impacted individuals The city will temporarily store items left behind on the sidewalk for up to 30 days.
 - Place 250 chronic homeless individuals into permanent supportive housing Earlier this year, the City launched an innovative Social Impact Bond Program that will help transition people living on the streets into housing and services.
 - Give a Better Way relaunch In response to the growing number of drive-by curbside drop offs of food and other items to the homeless, the city will begin a renewed push around better ways to give.
 - Pilot Employment Program The city is planning to launch a jobs program this spring/summer that would provide opportunities for homeless individuals to work for city departments.
- The safest, most sanitary and dignified place for people experiencing homelessness is indoors. Without the stability of a place to sleep each night, it is very difficult to achieve self-sufficiency. Anyone needing shelter services is urged to contact the Mile High United Way at 2-1-1, or if it is an emergency, such as in bitter cold weather, call 9-1-1.

Denver plans to clear homeless camps near Samaritan House next week

Homeless camps that first sprung up on sidewalks near the downtown Samaritan House shelter last summer soon will get an eviction notice.

The city plans to provide advance warning early next week and on Tuesday will begin removing any remaining items left on public sidewalks or other public property, according to a notice obtained by The Denver Post and confirmed by city officials.

If the city doesn't take action, officials say, the area will face "a looming public health and safety emergency."

The city is taking a tougher stance toward the camps with a new multi-agency effort. It will mark the first clearing of downtown camps on this scale in recent memory, an official said, though police have conducted smaller periodic sweeps near the South Platte River and also have used a controversial camping ban to move people off the streets.

In recent months, homeless campers have moved around the area near Lawrence Street and Park Avenue after the city has cleared sidewalks for cleaning — as frequently as five days a week in January.

Despite ongoing attempts since September by city departments and homeless outreach groups to connect people to shelters and other services, the camping has persisted. Some people have resisted offers of shelter beds.

"I know for a lot of these people, it comes down to not wanting to be confined to an enclosed area, and some are just here for the legalized marijuana and can't do that indoors," said Daniel Dishman, a frequent visitor of the Lawrence Street Community Center. "More than that, the minimum wage here is too low and the cost of living is too high. You have to be able to compromise with the homeless. If you don't want their furniture on the streets, give them somewhere else to put it."

Julie Smith, a city spokeswoman, remains optimistic their efforts have begun to make an impact.

"Together, through this intensive and focused effort, we have helped hundreds of people and supported the community," Smith said in a statement to The Post. "However, the health, safety and welfare of those who continue to live outside on the streets and sidewalks is nearing a crisis. This unsafe, unhealthy, unsanitary and inhumane situation must be addressed."

But the plan sparked concerns for John Parvensky, president of the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless.

"It is unfortunate that the city is moving more aggressively to enforce the camping ban ordinance at this time," Parvensky wrote in an e-mail. "While we agree with the mayor's office and businesses that the current conditions of people sleeping on the streets around the shelters is not sustainable, criminalization is not the answer."

The city's one-page notice, titled "Notice of Property Removal and Regular Sidewalk Cleanings," actually relies not on <u>Denver's 2012 camping ban</u> but on an older ordinance. That law empowers the Department of Public Works to order the removal of articles or vehicles that are "encumbering any street, alley, sidewalks, parkway or other public way or place," while the camping ban more broadly prohibits unauthorized camping on public and private property.

The city says it will begin posting the notice Monday morning, giving a 24-hour heads-up before property removal would start. Outreach workers also will provide the notice to campers.

The notice urges people to move all property, including small electronic devices, medications and important documents, or else the city will take it away. Workers will take cleared property to a secured warehouse on Glenarm Place downtown for up to 30 days, the city says. The notice says people can claim their confiscated property between noon and 2 p.m. on weekdays.

Smith added that the city will ramp up efforts to connect the campers with services at the same time it more strictly enforces city codes.

Also planned: the relaunch of a campaign, called "Give a Better Way," that encourages people who want to help to do so in better ways rather than dropping off food, mattresses and other items, as has been done; and a pilot city jobs program for the homeless this spring or summer.

One impetus cited for the crackdown: the opening in November of the Lawrence Street Community Center, a day center built mostly with city money next to the Denver Rescue Mission men's shelter.

While the center has been used heavily during the day, Ballpark neighbors told The Post recently that sidewalk encampments have increased nearby overnight. And city officials say the center has provided more options during the day and should give the homeless reason to seek shelter at night.

A city fact sheet on the coming plan says the Rescue Mission's downtown and overflow shelters have been at 79 percent capacity, and no shelters have been turning people away. It also says 650 people have been connected since September with medical and mental health help, food, bus passes, housing and other services, but it doesn't break that down between people who already were in shelters and those staying outside.

"I know that if it wasn't for these shelters there would be a lot more hungry people on the streets," Dishman said. "But a lot of people, for different reasons, aren't social and don't want to be confined with or around other people inside."

Not all campers have wanted to stay in shelters overnight, either.

"The shelters are not a good place for us," Alexis Ross, 20, told The Post in September, describing them as unclean and full of bed bugs. "That is why we are in the street."

Parvensky called the city's property-clearing plan "costly and counterproductive."

"The real solution to this issue is developing additional safe and appropriate emergency shelter and creating enough housing and service options so that those currently living on the streets can move into long-term housing for good."

The city recently moved ahead with a long-discussed "social impact bond" program that in coming years will provide up to 250 of the city's most chronically homeless individuals with supportive housing. But advocates and City Council members note the impact of that program, while laudable, will be limited for the larger homeless community.

Other plans in Denver include the opening later this year of a "solutions" center in Athmar Park that will offer behavioral health services and temporary shelter to homeless people.

But the city still faces more demand for homeless housing than it can provide, leaving shelters as the stop-gap — if people want to use them.

Protocols for guests with lice usually involve disposal of infected clothing and provision of new clothing. Linens are washed and replaced each day. Vinyl mats are disinfected (mats are designed for disinfection in large environments such as those in hospitals, etc.--not the traditional home mattresses that cannot easily or repeatedly cleaned).

Dear Communicators:

For the past several months, we have been working to address the sidewalk encampments in the Ballpark area. In September, you helped develop messaging and handle media (<u>Denver stepping up homeless outreach at encampment</u>, <u>Denver Post</u>). We are about to step up those efforts and we would like to reconvene with you Monday. Please watch for a separate calendar item inviting you to join a meeting of agency representatives. Here is some additional information:

Since September, the City, homeless outreach workers and other providers have increased
efforts to connect those who are living on the streets in and around the Ballpark Neighborhood
with essential services.

- This coincides with a significant increase by the Department of Public Works, with the
 assistance of the Denver Police and Sheriff Departments, to clear debris from the sidewalks in
 the Balipark Neighborhood. Public Works has been power-washing and removing trash three
 times a week from sidewalks near the Samaritan House and Denver Rescue Mission homeless
 shelters.
- With the November opening of the Lawrence Street Community Center, we had hoped the
 number of people living on, and the amount of items piling up on, the sidewalks would diminish.
 Unfortunately, that has not been the case. In fact, this unsafe, unhealthy and inhumane
 situation is only getting worse, with dozens of people continuing to live on the streets even in
 dangerous winter weather.
- Therefore, we will be taking the following steps in order to protect people, maintain public health, and respond to mounting concerns from nearby residents and businesses:
 - o Increase from three days a week to five trash removal and sidewalk power washing by Public Works and Sheriff Department work crews.
 - Encourage members of the public who engage in "drive by" drop-offs of food and other items that there is a better way to give.
 - o Escalate efforts to connect people with services. DPD officers will be:
 - Verbally directing those who remain on the sidewalk to indoor services.
 - o Clarify police enforcement by:
 - Verbally warning folks if they or their belongings are violating city laws (unauthorized camping, obstructing or encumbering the public right of way)
 - Issuing written warnings
 - Issuing written citations
 - Making arrests
- While DPD will retain the belongings of anyone taken into custody, we are still working on a plan to retain abandoned belongings for up to 30 days.

Additional facts:

- o The Lawrence Street Community Center is serving 785 to 850 unique gets per day and has provided 55,690 meals from Nov. 23 Jan. 1.
- The facility is allowing anyone who wants to bring their belongings into the courtyard to do so.
- Even while shelters are providing beds and mats to as many as 1,500 people per night, the Denver Rescue Mission shelter and nearby overflow facility at Peoria are operating at 79 percent of capacity. If anyone wants to come inside day or night, they will not be turned away.
- According to DPD and service providers, the main reason people continue to live on the sidewalk is so they can use drugs.

Hi Bennie-- Some points that may be helpful at the Dist 9 RNO's meeting...

Ongoing issues concerning Dist. 9

- We are continuing to work on mapping overnight and day services through the city per a request brought forward by Curtis Park Neighbors
 - o We will defer mapping of project based housing to a larger mapping effort currently underway by the State and CHFA that should detail this information.
 - We would like to capture some forthcoming modifications in the overnight shelter network in the mapping effort. These include:
 - Closure of the Peoria Temporary Shelter facility in East Denver
 - Inclusion of forthcoming shelter options outside of District 9.
- We will be increasing efforts to prevent curbside donations through our Give a Better Way campaign.
 - o This month's Denver Voice features a supportive voice from Denver Rescue Mission, requesting the well-intentioned to Not provide donations at the curb.
- In partnership with Denver Human Services and varied city agencies we are looking to pilot a day work program to assist individuals to move to a full day's work directly from the street.
- The City of Denver will be hosting its second region-wide housing summit to galvanize commitments around affordability throughout the Denver Metro Region.

On the "sweep" of Lawrence St. and Triangle

- General talking points on health and safety issues driving the action.
 - O Agencies and businesses immediate to the area of the Lawrence St. encampments were supportive of this action. Service agencies have been witness to ongoing unreported violent crime associated with entrenched encampments. This has included multiple rapes and beatings of women sheltered immediate to the area. Additionally, Catholic Charities provides 30 family shelter rooms at Samaritan House. Encampments had been threatening to school children boarding and unboarding busses.
- Notification of encumbrance removal was provided through the weekend preceding the sweep by Street
 Outreach and fliers. Signage was posted advising that items remaining after that Monday would be removed by
 Public Works, and stored for up to 30 days at 1221 Glenarm PI (one mile from the site).
 - o The City has met these commitments, which are not mandated by ordinance.
 - O Shelter for single adults remains available. Our shelter network has not turned anyone away for lack of space, however we know many still remain outside.
 - Few (if any) have arrived to reclaim items.
 - The ordinance that assigns the responsibility and authority to Public Works to maintain thoroughfares is not a criminal ordinance. No citations were issued in association with the steps taken to clear the streets.

On DSOC work in the Triangle

- Denver Street Outreach is providing an estimated 14 hours each week of time directly at the Triangle and adjacent areas.
 - These hours are followed up with an estimated 26 hours each week of office/agency based case management.
 - Outreach workers anticipate housing up to 7 individuals from the Triangle area within the month after the encumbrance removal
- Street Outreach is not the only presence in the Triangle area. Additionally DHS Caseworkers have been arriving, with one stationed daily directly at Catholic Charities.

One talking point missing from the list is something I heard from both Alexxa and Chris.

- The encampment is preventing some people experiencing homelessness who want to access the shelter from doing so. We have heard from homeless individuals, especially women, who say they are fearful of crossing through this encampment to get to the shelter. This prevents them from accessing a warm, safe place to sleep at night and the services offered at the shelter.

Finally, what about the social media side of things? We have the video from DPD that demonstrates the conditions, (DPD's photog told me he wouldn't go down there w/out police escort, btw - emphasizing the safety perception) and Jesse is grabbing our camera this morning in the event we want to get our own testimonials... but I am lost on who would host it if we did do something. DRH has very few followers.

Distilling the points Evan sent to 311 into an elevator for appointees:

- the health, safety and welfare of those who have continued to live outside on the streets and sidewalks in the Ballpark neighborhood is nearing a crisis.
- The city will be increasing efforts to connect people with services and avoid a looming public health and safety emergency.
- Since last September, multiple city agencies have been working closely with homeless outreach
 workers and providers to connect people living on the streets in the neighborhood with shelter,
 housing and services, including opening the new Lawrence Street Community Center in
 partnership with the Denver Rescue Mission.
 - Each year, the City and County of Denver spends more than \$40 million on direct and indirect costs related to homelessness. There is shelter space and services available for those who seek it, they don't have to be in these unsafe and unhealthy conditions.
- We are taking great care to protect, and make available for retrieval, the personal belongings of these individuals as we work to keep the neighborhood clean and sanitary.
